- 2. Can you recount a conversation over a difficult topic that resulted in a failure to connect?
- 3. Is the Bible's diversity of perspectives a liability or an asset to faith?
- 4. What does the Bible's diversity say about biblical authority? Can the Bible remain authoritative even in its diversity?
- 5. What do you hope for in this study during the Advent season?

Discussion Questions for Chapter 2

- 1. Which creation text is your favorite and why? Which creation text speaks with greatest relevance for today?
- 2. Is there a way of finding common ground among these various creation accounts?
- 3. How does the creation of Adam as a nongendered human being becoming gendered with the creation of Eve impact your notion of gender?
- 4. What does it take for us to "make peace" with creation?

Discussion Questions for Chapter 3 (Torah)

- 1. Do you see Old Testament "law" as a burden or as a gift? Or something else?
- 2. How do biblical notions of **torah** differ from "law" as you understand it?
- 3. Is Old Testament *torah* changeable or "written in stone" for all time?
- 4. How can "law" *(torah)* be a source of joy?
- 5. What do you do with certain "laws" in the Old Testament that allow for slavery or command exclusion from worship?
- 6. What is your source of joy during this Advent season?

Discussion Questions for Chapter 9 (God)

- 1. Does God ever change? What reasons are there for God to change God's mind according to certain biblical texts?
- 2. What is the relationship between God's mercy and God's justice?
- 3. According to 1 John 4:8, "God is love." How do the biblical texts discussed in this chapter deepen or nuance this claim?
- 4. How would you describe God's character in light of the Christmas story in dialogue with God's self-revelation in Exodus 34:6-7?
