From the Office of the President: Laying the Path Forward

Through a phased-in approach and using our Strategic Blueprint, President Aloyo, the Vice Presidents, and their respective departments fashioned departmental priorities in the summer of 2024, collaborating with the various stakeholders on campus.

One of those institutional priorities was to begin assessing our programs and initiatives and determining their relevance to our mission to educate and nurture faithful, imaginative, and effective leaders for the sake of the church and the world.

Phase I:

In Phase I, We identified the <u>Appreciative Inquiry Model</u> of organizational change as a primary tool for this work because it focuses on building upon an organization's strengths rather than approaching change with a deficiency mindset.

Appreciative Inquiry encourages organizations to grow and evolve in the direction of what's already working, instead of "fixing" a problem. Therefore, since September 2024, we have been deliberating on the specific components of this model, preparing our Seminary community for Phase II.

Phase II:

In Phase II, the seminary community will engage in focus group conversations around a series of appreciative inquiry questions designed to identify our key assets as we strive to improve our capacity to achieve the Seminary's mission, vision, and strategic goals.

With the guidance of Rev. Dr. Trace Haythorn and informed by our Strategic Blueprint, market research, and Comprehensive Campaign Research, the PC held a mid-year retreat on January 13 in which we began preparing a framework for assessment. Together, we will explore our distinctive strengths and investigate old patterns that may be keeping us from reaching our full potential.

Over the coming weeks, Dr. Haythorn and Lucy Baum will invite staff, faculty, trustees, and students to participate in I-hour focus group conversations addressing the same series of questions. Participant responses will be recorded and analyzed utilizing Atlas TI (a qualitative analysis software) to assess key themes. The identified themes will inform a report to the President's Council for an April 2025 meeting.

Phase III:

Beginning in the summer of 2025, Phase III will use the data gathered and themes identified in Phase II to make recommendations for how best to direct the seminary's energy and resources to accomplish our mission and vision going forward.

The determinations of this assessment process will be presented to the President's Council in early 2026 to make appropriate impact decisions for the 2026-2027 academic and fiscal year. The Seminary will begin implementing appropriate decisions on July 1, 2026.

The Strategic Implementation Team, chaired by Lucy Baum, will communicate regularly with the Seminary community throughout this process.

Flourishing and Belonging:

One of Columbia's strengths is its diversity of students, faculty, denominational representation, and cultural realities.

Located in the hub of the modern-day civil rights movements, Columbia is poised to build upon its Reformed tradition, geographical location, and core values of inclusive community, mutual respect, becoming and belonging, and excellence as it recognizes the rapidly changing societies and varied contexts in which ministry is being and will be done.

Flourishing at and beyond Columbia Theological Seminary requires all persons to pursue justice as they work towards honoring and promoting diversity, equity, and inclusion in their many contexts.

We are demonstrating this commitment by investing our resources in implementing the position of Senior Advisor for Flourishing and Belonging. We are pleased to announce that <u>Dr. Rafael Reyes III</u> has been called to be the inaugural Senior Advisor for Flourishing and Belonging.

Dr. Reyes has been the Graduate Director of Student Life & Community Engagement at Katz School of Science and Health at Yeshiva University in New York City. Before that, he worked at New York Theological Seminary as an assistant professor of theology and religious studies in several administrative posts and taught at the University of San Diego. Dr. Reyes holds a PhD in Religion from

the Claremont School of Theology and master's degrees from Claremont, Drew University, New York Theological Seminary, and Alliance Theological Seminary.

In this role at Columbia, Dr. Reyes will be directly responsible to the Office of the President and will provide leadership to the entire Columbia community, especially by directing its efforts toward cohesive, collaborative, and comprehensive programs that support these core values at all institutional levels. As part of the JEDI (Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion) mapping process, Dr. Reyes will utilize the spring semester to have conversations with students, alums, faculty, staff, and trustees in exploring the next steps toward our exploration of defining and refining elements of flourishing and belonging.

Honoring Excellence - Student Formation and Campus Culture

In the last academic year, the President's Office, through the Office of Human Resources, implemented the Honoring Excellence Initiative in gratitude to offices and departments providing invaluable services driven by the Seminary's mission. We began by celebrating our facilities staff, the security team, the CLL staff, and the Information Systems Team (Library). On March II, 2025, we will celebrate the stellar staff of the Student Formation and Campus Culture department. More information will be forthcoming from the Office of Human Resources.

Common Messaging & Talking Points:

Manifesting a clearer understanding of why we exist as an educational institution of the Presbyterian Church (USA) will be essential as we continue our mission and vision of forming the next generation



of Servant-Leader-Scholars to renew the Church and transform the world. As faculty, staff, and President Aloyo continue our Friendraising and Partnership-Building ventures, designing a standard message with appropriate talking points is critical. In a short-term exercise of defining the Seminary's identity, we will conduct an intersectional approach to embracing the Seminary's standard message and talking points based on our strengths and aspirations during these next few weeks. Institutional Identity:

In an ambitious long-term initiative, the Seminary recognizes that God is actively present in creation, even as our world undergoes constant change. Grasping the essence of the Church's mission—both in our local context and globally—is vital for our enduring flourishing and revitalization. The Seminary community, encompassing trustees, faculty, students, alums, and staff, will embark on a year-long, purposeful dialogue to reflect on our core identity.

While our mission and vision statements provide a solid foundation for our activities, it is critical to understand the "why" driving our work as an educational institution of the Presbyterian Church (USA) in Atlanta.

This understanding has profound implications, reaching across the Southeast, throughout the United States, and around the world. It transcends mere philosophy and denominationalism; it is essential for cultivating clarity, focus, and direction for building a pool of servant-leader-scholars who aim to renew the Church and transform the world.

Without a well-defined "why," Columbia risks becoming adrift, pursuing one project after another, and responding impulsively to every opportunity. Conversely, by solidifying our "why," we can create alignment, motivate our teams, and make informed decisions that promote sustainable growth and transformation.

As we enter the threshold of our third century, it's important to consider our internal mission and purpose from our market's perspective. Why do the Church and future servant-leader-scholars need us? What gap are we filling, and what evolving issues require the information we provide through our research and scholarship? What characteristics of the evolving Church indicate a need for renewal, and why would learners want to be a part of that renewal and receive their preparation at Columbia?

Understanding our external "why" will help us define our unique value proposition. Rather than attempting to serve everyone, how can we at Columbia focus on addressing specific needs uniquely and substantively?

Our Spring 2025 initiatives include:

As part of our planning in the fall semester, we identified the need to review and revise the way Columbia tells its story. To ensure that we can enter the modern era of storytelling with a presence both digitally and in print, we are rethinking everything from our online newsroom to our social media presence to our videos to our print presence. You may have noticed the absence of Vantage, and that is because we have paused it as we review and reshape our strategy.

Editorial Board: In December of 2024,
 Columbia's Editorial Board met for the first time, and we will resume meeting next month.

Faculty Search:

Columbia's search for a new professor of World Christianities continues in the spring term, with three on-campus interviews the week of February 10-14, 2025. The committee, which is chaired by Christine Roy Yoder and includes Tim Hartman, Nicole Symmonds, Raj Nadella, Sue Kim Park, Montisa Watkins, and Trustees Alan Thornburg and Lesa Kestler, invites the community to participate in the public lectures and sample classes of our semi-finalists and will invite your feedback as part of this vital discernment process. The detailed schedule is forthcoming. The committee's goal is to recommend a final candidate to the Board of Trustees in March and, with their approval, welcome our newest faculty member to the Columbia community on July 1, 2025!

Faculty Travel Seminars:

Faculty travel seminars continue in March as part of our QEP (Quality Enhancement Plan) and the Seminary's commitment to foster intercultural **intelligence** in faculty, staff, and students. Some faculty members will travel to Washington, DC, to focus on Jewish and Muslim interfaith dialogue through visits to the Holocaust Museum, the Islamic Center, The Museum of the Palestinian People, and other institutions. Other faculty members will travel to Los Angeles, Calif., to focus on interreligious and interfaith theological education through visits to the University of the West, the University of Southern California, and the Claremont School of Theology. These trips are exceptional opportunities for our faculty to engage together in immersion learning experiences and explore intercultural pedagogies.

Transitions:

Interim Vice President: Tim Norton, beginning on January 27, 2025, will serve as Columbia's Interim Vice President for Philanthropic Advancement for the next few months. In addition, with the services of **Coxe Curry**, the Office of Philanthropic Advancement will undergo a departmental assessment to identify its strengths and gaps as we fashion a new position description for the permanent Vice President for Philanthropic Advancement and begin a national search in the proceeding months.

The Comprehensive Campaign:

The Comprehensive Campaign development will continue, guided by Rebekah Groover, our new Senior Director for Strategic Giving, the President's Council, and the Comprehensive Campaign Executive Committee.

Partners in Ministry (PIM):

Columbia Theological Seminary will host two Partners in Ministry events this fiscal year to engage new donors and steward existing supporters toward multi-year commitments. The first event will occur on February 19 in Greenville, S.C., at Fourth Presbyterian Church, and the second will be held on May 8 in Charlotte, N.C. 
